The Epistle Lesson – 1 Corinthians 12:1-11

Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to You, Lord Christ.

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. Sermon

The Nicene Creed

Just as we celebrated the Confession of St Peter on Friday, so this Friday we Episcopalians celebrate the Conversion of St Paul the Apostle. Most of us are familiar with the story of Saul's persecution of the Christians and his being struck blind on the road to Damascus. We're probably less familiar with the many attempts over the years to explain it away. From time to time, Paul's miraculous conversion has been attributed to temporal lobe epilepsy, a psychotic event, or a meteor strike. What we know is that, after his conversion, Paul went on to write at least seven of the books in the New Testament and to have seven others attributed to him with varying degrees of confidence among scholars. His letters predated the first Gospel by at least ten years and profoundly shaped the theology of the Christian church.
