If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. The Nicene Creed

Each year on February 2, the church celebrates the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus at the Temple, also known as the Feast of the Purification, or *Candlenas*. This feast commemorates the 40th day after Jesus' birth, when he was presented in the Jerusalem Temple and Mary was purified in accordance with Jewish Law.

The Book of Leviticus mandates that, after childbirth, a woman must go to the temple to offer "two turtle-doves or two pigeons, one for a burnt-offering and the other for a sin-offering; and the priest shall make atonement on her behalf, and she shall be clean" (Leviticus 12:8). The Gospel of Luke describes the Presentation of Jesus at the Temple, when St. Simeon the Righteous saw Jesus in the temple and "took him in his arms and praised God," saying, "My eyes have seen your salvation" (Luke 2:30). This blessing by Simeon is the basis for Canticle 17, *Nunc dimittis*, or "The Song of Simeon," on p 93 of the BCP.
