The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Praise God for those in every generation in whom Christ has been honored. Pray that we may have grace to glorify Christ in our own day.

Today, we celebrate the Feast of Janani Luwum, a modern-day martyr. He was archbishop of Uganda during the reign of strongman Idi Amin in the mid-1970s. As archbishop, he organized a protest among all Christians against Amin, culminating in Amin's summoning Luwum to Amin's palace. The Christian leaders who accompanied Luwum were dismissed but Amin ordered Luwum retained. He was never seen alive again. Amin's government announced that he had died in an automobile accident while resisting arrest, then delivered his bullet-riddled body to Luwum's family several weeks later.

Early in his confrontation with the Ugandan government, Archbishop Luwum answered one of his critics by saying, "I do not know how long I shall occupy this chair. I live as though there will be no tomorrow... While the opportunity is there, I preach the gospel with all my might, and my conscience is clear before God."
